Following on from the success of our inaugural conference in 2012, ECI decided to host a series of events in different parts of the country.

The first was a workshop in Kilkenny co-speaker was Christian author and ecohosted with local eco-churches. Columban theologian, author & former missionary, Fr appointed Churches & Theology Director Seán McDonagh SSC, and sustainability, energy and climate change consultant, Gavin Harte, both gave insightful & thought-provoking talks on the theme 'Live Simply, Live Well – why Christians should care about the environment'.

Members of the Cashel & Ossory Diocese



(Church of Ireland) Eco Committee and of the Inchicore group of (Roman Catholic) parishes gave interesting presentations about the eco initiatives they have undertaken. It was hoped this would encourage members of other churches to start taking steps to 'green' their churches & their own lives.

Catherine Brennan SSL & members of Inchicore spent a day filming for a US television channel, which was interested to showcase the work of ECI.

A Creation Care sharing network has developed in Northern Ireland, which sees members of different eco-congregations meeting together to share ideas and encourage each other in their endeavours. Participants have been involved in activities ranging from recycling, bulb-planting, making nesting boxes, collecting and sowing wildflower seeds, growing fruit and vegetables, studying and monitoring birds, moths and butterflies, and taking part in anti-fracking demonstrations.

In Belfast ECI partnered with A Rocha UK & Christians in Science in an event on the theme 'How do we live well as Christians in a consumer culture?' The keynote activist, Ruth Valerio, who has since been of A Rocha UK.

We encouraged churches around Ireland to mark **Creation Time** (September 1 to October 4) with special services and events. This year's theme was 'Water Justice' & ECI was once again involved in preparing Creation Time resources for Churches Together in Britain and Ireland ~ www.ctbi.org.uk/295.

Three Rock Churches' Environment **Group** - an ECI initiative that sees eight churches working together on environmental issues in Dublin - held a prayer and meditation Harvest Time service, which enabled Christians with a concern for the environment to meet together to worship, pray & encourage each other in their endeavours.

We were delighted to share a stall with A Rocha at **New Horizons** in Coleraine where we encouraged conference partici-



pants to make the link between environment care & their Christian faith & to adopt an eco approach to their lives—at home, church & in their local communities.

Awards, awards!

We were delighted to present three welldeserved awards in 2013. Awards are made to churches or dioceses that have been working consistently on environmen- gan. They continue to recycle, promote tal issues for two years or more; they are judged by independent assessors. Award applicants are expected to demonstrate that they have undertaken eco initiatives in four areas – practical, spiritual, commuimal Welfare Group and for overseas pronity & global.

the second diocese ever to win an ECI diocesan award. The diocesan eco committee produces a newsletter, organises seminars & runs a green award scheme. Many parishes have adopted eco initiatives, like planting trees, shrubs & bulbs, erecting bird & bat boxes & promoting biodiversity. Some have installed solar panels and made church land available for allotments. The diocese is to be particularly commended for its Green Charter, which has been adopted by all parishes. The eco committee has brought this to General Synod in the hopes that all parishes in the Church of Ireland will adopt a similar charter.

Kilbride Presbyterian Church was the recipient of ECI's 10th award. As well as its commitment to energy-saving practices & preserving the environs of its church building & grounds in a sustainable manner, this small rural congregation in Co Antrim has spearheaded a number of initiatives to benefit the local community, including litter picks, bulb-planting & the development of a local river walk. A stargazing night was held & a speaker from The Woodland Trust gave a talk. Hymns & prayers often include a Creation theme & prayer & meditation is sometimes held outside. Sunday School often includes an environmental dimension & the children have helped with bulb- and tree-planting. The congregation supports people in developing countries already impacted by climate change by holding Christian Aid lunches, quizzes & door-to-door collections & by volunteering overseas.
