We encourage parishes, faith communities and dioceses to take action in four areas of church life practical, spiritual, community and global. When a parish or community has been working consistently for two years or more on introducing an environmental aspect to these four areas, we encourage them to apply for an award. We then arrange a visit to be made by two of our independent assessors.
