Rev Elaine passed the candle over to Rev Sarah Marry who lit it at the 'Jazz Harvest Eucharist' in St Anne's Church, Shandon and ECI's Chair Andrew Orr was the preacher. The President of the Methodist Church, Rev Dr Laurence Graham, delivered the Climate Justice Candle to Clonakilty Methodist Church whilst on a visit to the West Cork Circuit on Friday 29th September 2017. The church members coordinated various activities around the visit of the candle including inviting four local schools to take part in a number of competitions for different age groups to highlight the issue of climate justice and opening their church for people to view the



competition entries which were judged by local artist, Lorraine King-Marshall.

Climate Justice was the theme of the Harvest Thanksgiving Service and the main speaker was Sr. Margaret Twomey from the Sisters of Mercy in Clonakilty. She spoke about Eco-Congregation Ireland, the challenge of climate change, the issue of the Sabbath in the context of increasing economic development and the Biblical imperative of being good stewards of God's creation. Members felt that hosting the Climate Justice Candle challenged them about their impact on the environment and has raised awareness of the issue of 'Climate Justice' in their community. # Fran Brady, ECI Quaker Representative Gives Culture Night Talk

Eco-Quakers Ireland originated in 2008 when a concern was brought by two Members to Ireland Yearly Meeting under the title 'Caring for Creation – what canst thou do?' These Friends were encouraged to take the concern further. Seventeen Quakers from around Ireland held a Meeting on

### Westport Eco-Congregation holds Zero Waste Event

On Monday 2nd of October, Westport Eco-Congregation were delighted to host their first Zero Waste event, presented by local teacher Roisin Brady, who captured the hearts and minds of a fascinated audience over 150 in Westport Town Hall. Roisin has been limiting the creation of waste in her house of 3 adults, 2 children and 4 pets for the past 20 months by creating a jam jar of waste every month! The event was part of a series of events for Season of Creation was very timely as it took place during National Reuse Month.



Fr.Charlie McDonnell was in attendance and his reflection on the night was: *Roisins presentation was certainly an eye opener, not just to all that can be achieved, but more frighteningly to all that we are avoiding or ignoring. ## Carlow Union of Parishes: Being a Welcoming Parish to All God's Creation

In February 2017, the Cashel, Ferns and Ossory Environmental Committee held a Conference in Kilkenny College called 'Inside and Out – A Half-day Conference on how to save energy expenses and new ways to improve your Church Environs.' One of the presenters, Dr. Úna Fitzpatrick, spoke about how vital it is to work to promote the wellbeing of pollinators. This presentation



inspired the Sunday Club of Carlow Union of Parishes and their leaders to consider implementing the All-Ireland Junior Pollinator Plan 2015-2020. The children and their leaders embarked on a project to be a *Welcoming Parish to All God's Creation*. The project was a great success and they entered the competition for a Diocesan Eco-Award. They were awarded a prize at the Diocesan Synod in October under the category 'Motivation of the Young.' 'Food for all ... for ever' was the title of the second Harvest weekend conference at South Belfast Methodist Agape Centre on 23rd September. The event was organised by Tony Weekes (South Belfast Quaker Meeting) and Richard Clarke (South Belfast Methodist Church). A similar event last year - Enough is Plenty - inspired the form and

content. The social, environmental and ethical impacts of food are enormous: how we treat animals and the earth; the livelihoods of the farmers; the distribution and processing of their produce; food poverty, and food as a basic human right. ### New Repair Cafe in Belfast!

What do you do with a toaster that won't toast, a fritzy computer or a wonky bike? All too often, it lies in a shed or gets taken to the dump, when a simple repair could keep it going for years. Communities in Belfast will soon have a new solution - bring them to a Repair Café! These are volunteer-run, pop-up community events which will take place around the city, where skilled volunteers help people fix their stuff for free. It brings people together, keeps waste out of landfill,

keeps traditional skills alive and encourages re-use and repair. There are more than 1,000 regular repair cafes around the world (many held in church halls and buildings) but none have been held in Northern Ireland...until now. A brand new co-operative farm is being set up in Larne in January 2018 in the beautiful walled garden at <u>Drumalis Retreat and Conference</u> <u>Centre</u> with people of all backgrounds and beliefs. Jubilee Farm is a recently established inter-denominational Christian creation care organisation whose vision is to engage churches, Christians and communities with creation care. Integrating care farming, community-supported agriculture (including the first CSA scheme in Northern Ireland), and conservation education and engagement, and using a

cooperative structure called a Community Benefit Society (BenCom), they hope to bring inspiring change to both the walled garden itself and to the surrounding communities.
