ECI Climate Justice Candle visits Tuam Parish

The Eco-Congregation Ireland Climate Justice Candle visited <u>Tuam Parish</u> as part of their Creation Time events. It provided the focus of a beautiful Children's Mass on Saturday evening. Fr. Pat Farragher's homily on Care for Creation was inspirational. Focusing again on the Candle at 12.30 mass Fr. Francis Mitchell pointed out that caring about climate justice was not an aspiration but a Christian duty, echoing Pope Francis' message in Laudato Si. After mass some of the congregation then accompanied the Climate

ECI Climate Justice Candle visits Ards Friary, Co Donegal

On Saturday 29 September Ards Friary held the opening day of a two week programme to celebrate the Season of Creation: 'Tread Lightly on the Earth'. Over 100 people attended an exhibition during day one and many more during the coming days. Twenty five Syrian refugees joined the retreat for the day, adults and children. Bishop John Kirby on seeing the mix of nationalities and religions remarked: "Ni neart go cur le cheile": unity is strength! Presence and neart



were the two main points of Rev Grace Clunie's talk, as she drew out how Celtic culture and spirituality contributes to a new ethical perspective on our changing climate chaos. Her talk was preceded by the lighting of the Eco-Congregation Ireland Climate Justice Candle. Rose of JPIC, lit the candle. She had just recently returned from Rwanda and Sierra Leone. Hillsborough Presbyterian Church, Co Down hosts the ECI Climate Justice Candle

Grace Davin, Eco Convener and Minister Rev Dr Allen Sleith, sent ECI a report on the candle's visit to Hillsborough. The Climate Justice Candle was delivered to Hillsborough Presbyterian Church in time for their Harvest Services on 21st October. The Church had been decorated by a team of willing flower arrangers to display the variety and abundance of the harvest we have enjoyed this year with flowers, fruit and vegetables. The evening service was attended by friends from the neighbouring Church of Ireland parish and the candle was centrally placed in the Sanctuary throughout.

The following week the Climate Justice Candle remained in its central position within the Sanctuary during the All Age Service, and later in the week it was taken to the church's Resource Area for a short Prayer and Reflection Time, using some of the resources from the ECI pack. It was again brought back to the Vestibule for the Communion Service, along with some books from the



library about Climate Change. It is hoped that this level of exposure to the congregation will have raised awareness of the urgency of addressing climate change and injustice. Joe Furphy, Presbyterian representative on the ECI committee also presented this congregation with an ECI Awareness certificate. Awards! Awards! Newtownbreda Presbyterian Church, Belfast receives ECI Award and hosts the ECI Climate Justice Candle all in one week!

The Climate Justice Candle was set on the communion table of Newtownbreda Presbyterian Church for their ECI Award Service on Sunday 18th November 2018 where Joe Furphy, Presbyterian representative on the ECI committee presented this congregation with their Eco-Congregation Ireland award. At the start of the service Ken Orr, a member of our church's eco committee, introduced the candle to the congregation. He talked about how the candle is travelling round Ireland and being hosted by various churches and groups who are concerned about climate justice issues and care for God's creation.



The bible readings, hymns and anthem were chosen to fit with the theme of caring for creation, while the prayers of intercession were split into three parts representing land, sea and sky, praying for healing for the damage done to the natural cycles in each domain. A tea light was lit after each prayer, and then a final light on the Climate Justice Candle as a symbol of the Holy Spirit helping us to care for the earth and all creation. The Rev Tolland's sermon used the words of Psalm 8, and her recent experiences of the biodiversity of Namibia, to bring out a deep lesson on the significance of our stewardship of the earth's resources. In the following days, the candle made appearances at meetings of the Squirrels and Beavers youth organisations, and at the Root Soup Community Lunch which is held in the halls each week. Awards! Awards! SMA Parish, Wilton, Cork receives ECI Award!

Sunday, November 3, 2018, was a momentous and historic day for the SMA parish at Wilton, Cork. After years of community collaboration and creativity, inspired by Pope Francis' great environmental encyclical Laudato Si', the parish was presented with their Eco-Congregation Ireland Award. This was recognised as a significant development both by the Diocese of Cork and Ross and by the City of Cork, evidenced by the presence of Bishop Buckley and by Cllr. Fergal Denney, representing the



Lord Mayor of Cork. The award was presented by Sr. Catherine Brennan, Catholic representative on the ECI committee, who travelled from Dublin on behalf of Eco-Congregation Ireland to make the presentation. Alleluia, alleluia." Later two members of the Laudato Si group proudly carried aloft the framed Endeavour

Gardiner Street Parish, Dublin receives ECI Awareness Certificate!

<u>Gardiner Street Parish</u> in north inner city Dublin was delighted to receive an Awareness Certificate from Eco-Congregation Ireland this summer. The Certificate marks the formal beginning of Gardiner



Street's eco-journey in response to Pope Francis' invitation to communities to value our common home. Over recent years, the parish has implemented a number of changes to improve its eco-footprint. These include installing energy saving light-bulbs in the church to boost energy efficiency, introducing Fair-Trade

products, minimising waste and improving recycling in the church building, and, with the support of Dublin City Council and Sunflower Recycling, planting pollinator-friendly plants at the front of the church building. The parish has hosted street clean-ups and presentations on caring for our common home, regularly provides eco-tips, and has handed out sunflower seeds to parishioners. Gardiner Street Parish now looks forward to progressing its eco-journey, hopefully towards an Eco Congregation Ireland Award. Laudato Sí Working Group News

The Eco-Congregation Ireland newsletter will now host a regular column from the Laudato Sí Working Group. This group was established in 2016 to promote action on Laudato Sí in the Catholic Church in Ireland. The group is composed of a range of experts from different fields such as theology, ecology, pastoral work, development, climatology and education. Their vision is a vibrant church in Ireland which is true to its vocation to care for the earth, rooted in a deep eco-spirituality. Amongst other things, the group led efforts to bring ecology into the World Meeting of Families through Our Common Home project, promoted the Season of Creation and supported the divestment of the Irish Bishops Conference from fossil fuels. It also provides in-service trainings for church groups. The group can be reached on social media by @LaudatoSi_IRE or by contacting Lorna Gold in Trócaire lorna.gold@trocaire.org.

The Laudato Sí Working Group met in November to discuss progress and agree key priorities for the coming year. Here is a short summary of what is in the pipeline:


- New parish resource on Implementing Laudato Sí. Building on the success of the Trócaire Glás resource and the Eco-Congregation Ireland resources, the plan is to partner with Veritas in the spring to produce a new, easy to use resource for parishes and communities. Suggestions of materials, reflections and ideas are welcome. Please contact Vivek in Veritas.
- Collaborate with the Irish Council for Justice and Peace in 2019 to roll out a series of regional meetings on Laudato Sí implementation. The first of these will take place in Dromantine in April. More details to follow.
- Work to ensure Laudato Sí is incorporated within the primary and senior curriculum for RE. Continue to
 work with those developing the senior cycle RE curriciulum and the Grow in Love programme for 6th
 Class. Engage with the roll out of the curriculum to make sure an integral ecology is prominent.
- Work to ensure work happening on adult faith development and adult catechesis in parishes includes Laudato Sí as an integral part of the Christian vocation.
- Participate in relevant citizen actions to promote climate justice policies, including the citizens' lobby of TDs organised by Stop Climate Chaos. Seek a meeting with the Minister for Climate Action to present the work of faith-based organisations in this area.
- Ensure parishes and groups receive information on Season of Creation 2019 in good time and are encouraged to participate in events.
- Support efforts to increase the number of faith-based organisations divesting from fossil fuels, including individual dioceses.

Other news: Jane Mellett from the Laudato Sí Working Group is currently participating on a Climate Pilgrimage from Assisi to Katowice where the COP will take place in a few weeks. Follow her pilgrimage and <u>send your intentions for climate justice here</u>. <u>Follow Jane's blog here</u>.

European Christian Environmental Network 12th Assembly in Katowice October 2018

The 12th Assembly of the <u>European Christian Environmental</u> <u>Network</u> met from 6-10 October 2018 under the heading 'On the way to economic and ecological justice' in Katowice in Poland, hosting 85 participants from 22 countries of Europe and overseas. Discussions of the Assembly were guided by the biblical words of the prophet Jeremiah 29:11 "I know the plans I have for you, says



the Lord, plans for your welfare and not for harm, to give you a future with hope."

Participants gathered to share joy in God's creation, to remind each other that everywhere it is under threat and that churches across Europe as well as in other parts of the world have a duty to care for creation; in worship, in action and in advocacy. The focus of the Assembly discussions was the relationship between economy and ecology; ways to achieve a just distribution of available resources while respecting the principles of economic and ecological justice. Reflection on the Shortest Day by Fr Hugh O'Donnell



'Caring for the Earth, Our Common Home' – Service in the Unitarian Church, St Stephens Green Dublin

The <u>Unitarian Church in St. Stephens Green Dublin</u> is working to encourage the congregation and their contacts to seriously play their part in working to secure a sustainable world for the generations that follow us. Tony Brady, a member of the congregation, will lead a service in the Unitarian Church on Sunday 9th December on the theme "Caring for the Earth, our common home". The Minister Rev. Bridget Spain has for years encouraged the now growing campaign to reduce our use of plastic and repeatedly emphasises the damage to our marine life caused by the accumulation of plastic particles in the oceans. World Council of Churches' Statement on COP 24 and Just Transition to Sustainable Economy

The <u>World Council of Churches</u> has issued a statement on COP 24 where it appeals to WCC member churches and ecumenical partners urgently to intensify their advocacy and action for climate justice and transition to sustainable economy in local, national and international arenas, as well as to promote the necessary lifestyle changes. <u>You can read this statement in full here</u>.



Latest News from Jubilee

Jubilee, the creation care organisation, is raising £310,000 to purchase a small farm outside Larne, Co Antrim, where they can bring ambitious plans for Jubilee Farm to fruition, with organic pigs, poultry, goats and vegetables, plus an internship programme, and even "glamping" in due course. Already, they've raised £165,000 from existing supporters to purchase the farmhouse. Now, they need to raise £145,000 to buy the 13.5 acres of land, as well as polytunnels and other equipment, by Christmas.



As a Community Benefit Society – a form of cooperative social enterprise – they're raising this money via a community share offer, making this the first community-owned farm in Northern Ireland. Launched in Belfast on 20th October, the minimum investment in the project starts from only £50, making it the perfect Christmas present (but hurry, the share offer closes on the 5th of December)! Managing Director Dr Jonny Hanson said, "Becoming a member of Jubilee Farm is the perfect opportunity for individuals, families, schools, churches, and community groups to come together and invest in a community enterprise that works for the benefit of everyone".

Mass of Harvest Thanksgiving held in Church of Our Lady of Mount Carmel Lacken, Blessington, Co Wicklow

Carmel O'Neill, one of the parishioners sent ECI this report: The annual mass of Harvest Thanksgiving was held on Saturday October 27th in the Church of Our Lady of Mount Carmel Lacken, Blessington. This event in Lacken Church attracted a large attendance from the farming community and neighbouring parishes.

The children from the local school brought up harvest gifts in the opening procession, read the prayer of the faithful and sang in the choir. Rev Trevor Sargent's Ecological Notes for December 2018 - Preparing the way for the Lord with more joy and less 'stuff'

Rev Trevor Sargent is one of the Church of Ireland representatives on the ECI committee. Trevor shared his Ecological Notes with us for the month of December.

There is no shortage of guides in the media telling us how to prepare for Christmas. These include guides to a greener Christmas, advocating support for local producers and re-using decorations etc.

Turning to the Bible for some guidelines, the Gospel of Luke (Luke 3: 1- 18) takes up the call in Isaiah to, 'Prepare the way of the Lord, make his paths straight'. On hearing all this, the people ask John the Baptist, 'What should



we do?' John answers, 'whoever has two coats must share with anyone who has none; and whoever has food must do likewise' (Luke 3:10). In essence, John the Baptist is saying quite directly to his audience, to get rid of 'stuff' and be content with what you have. The challenge for the modern Christian surrounded by a culture of consumerism is to ponder the possibility that there is more joy in owning less than we can ever find in owning more. So how does a minimalist celebrate Christmas? The focus is generally on exchanging experiences rather than giving things as gifts. Whatever you do in preparing the way of the Lord, this Advent, may it bring true happiness, for you, your family and friends, including planet Earth, which we hold in trust for our children's children. ECI Reflection – Advent and Ecological Conversion

In the Gospel reading for the second Sunday of Advent, John the Baptist calls us to repentance: "Prepare a way for the Lord, make his path straight". We are called to conversion, to a change of heart, in preparation for Christmas. Part of that conversion includes a change of heart in our relationships with the earth, in our relationships with the creatures of the world, and of course in our relationships with each other and the enduring presence of the Creator-Spirit within creation.

Pope Francis is very clear that we cannot save the planet without conversion (LS 216-221). He talks explicitly about the call to interior conversion and communal conversion. The conversion required during Advent in preparation for Christmas must include an ecological conversion that calls each one of us to protect and nurture the integrity of God's Creation. Being a Christian in the 21st century carries with it a commitment to care for God's creation, not as optional, but as something essential to Christian faith to day.

Prayer - (After Bruce Sanguin)

O Holy One we are a sleepy lot, slow to stir to the calling of the cosmos, deaf to the cries of the Earth and the forgotten ones, human and other-than-human. "O that you would tear open the heavens and come down," cries the prophet, and end this slumber that blocks out pain, and with it, wonder. Our hope, O Holy One, is found in eyes wide open, in small gestures of compassion, and in alertness to your coming, again and again. So we await to be set on fire with hope, and gospel passion for the earth.
