ECI Climate Justice Candle visits Good Shepherd Sisters in Belfast

ECI Climate Justice Candle visits Clogher Justice, Peace and Integrity of Creation Group

The ECI Climate Justice Candle was hosted by Clogher Justice, Peace and Integrity of Creation group and was installed in St Macartin's Church of Ireland, Enniskillen on 1 December and then in St Michael's Catholic Church across the street on the 8 December. After a week there it was taken to the Catholic Parish Church of Pobal in Tempo, Co Fermanagh.

Fr Joe McVeigh Assistant Priest, Enniskillen, spoke in St Michael's on Saturday 8 December 2018: 'Climate change is in the news every day and we need to be reminded that each of us has to do our bit for climate justice - if it is only with regard to the use of plastic. We have all seen pictures of the damage plastic is doing to sea life. We have a responsibility to care for the creation and the earth God has given us

New report from Christian Aid – 'Counting the Cost: A Year of Climate Breakdown'

Christian Aid's new report 'Counting the Cost: A Year of Climate Breakdown' identifies 10 of the most destructive droughts, floods, fires, heat-waves, typhoons and hurricanes of 2018, each of which caused damage of over US\$1 billion. Four of the events cost more than \$7 billion each. These figures are likely to be underestimates - in some cases they include only insured losses and do not take into account the costs of lost productivity and uninsured losses. All of these billion-dollar



disasters are linked with human-caused climate change. Read more and download the report here.

Latest News from St Anne's Church Shandon, Cork

Jer O' Sullivan sent ECI this update: <u>St Anne's Church Shandon</u> has now completed the ECI Environmental Check Up for Your Church document and is moving forward towards an application for an Eco-Congregation Ireland award!

The Select Vestry approved their working towards being an Eco-Congregation parish and they held their first meeting in December. Parishioners plan to join with friends in the North Cathedral who have established a similar group to see how they might work together in the local area and share ideas and resources. A meeting of both working groups was held during the Week of Prayer for



Christian Unity, reinforcing the message that this is an area where Christians can come together as they move in concern and compassion for our world and its people. The group has now published their first parish 'eco' newsletter. The 'eco-Pilgrim' includes some information about the plans and aspirations of the group and shares ideas that they, as individual consumers and households, can put into practice as they seek to respond to climate change. Latest News from Jubilee

In late 2018 Dr Jonny Hanson of <u>Jubilee</u> taught a three week evening course on Creation Care at Belfast Bible College. Session one was an overview of the biblical foundations of creation care, session two, on putting creation care into practice and session three on creation care and global poverty, which was delivered by Hannah Elliott of Tearfund NI.





Jubilee has successfully raised the £280,000 to buy their farm in Glynn, outside Larne in County Antrim from more than 110 member-owners, including several churches and religious orders! (View from the farm on the left). They have recently held a volunteer day. Read a recent BBC NI news article here. Also an article in the Larne Times. Their CARE - Care farming for Asylum Seekers, Refugees and the Environment - project began recently, with funding and referrals from various parts of the Irish church. The first four participants are from Ivory Coast, Iran

and Syria, and three of them were farmers in their home countries.

Update from VIVAT

Fr. Liam Dunne SVD, Convenor of VIVAT sent ECI an update on their work. Vivat in Ireland is formed of representatives of Missionary Sisters, servants of the Holy Spirit; the Spiritans; the Missionary Sisters of the Holy Rosary; The Little Sisters of the Assumption; the Divine Word Missionaries, the Oblates of Mary Immaculate and the Combonis. Their group is small but enthusiastic. They meet every two months in each one of their houses. Members use these meetings to share information; to seek ideas about matters of interest to their various Congregations and to draw up plans. Their



main activity during the year 2018 was the study of Laudato 'Si. Each group took one Chapter each, to study and presented the results to the group. They then evaluated and added further reflections. Members felt this was a worthy exercise as it stimulated everyone to learn more about the Cry of the Earth and to discover what they could do about it in their communities. News from a Friend of ECI from Down Under!

Anne Jennings is a friend of ECI from Australia who is working on her PhD at Nulungu Research Institute, School of Arts & Sciences, The University of Notre Dame Australia, Broome Campus on Laudato Si' and Ecological Conversion, using community development processes. She is a keen reader of the ECI newsletter. In 2017 she presented a paper at an international community development conference in New Zealand, examining the United Nations 2030 Agenda and the Sustainable Development Goals — SDGs, particularly as they relate to involvement by Australia.



Anne then ventured forward by exploring Pope Francis' Encyclical Laudato Si': On Care for Our Common Home. Her resultant paper briefly looked back at the SDG paper and then addressed Laudato Si' as another significant global document. The paper provided an overview of Laudato Si', examined differing views of what it presented, and concluded with a review of how and where community development theory and practices fit within its teachings. <u>Loving Sister Earth</u> participated in the Citizens' Lobby Day on Climate Change, 5th December in Buswells Hotel. Dublin. They will support UN Water Day on 22 March and UN Earth Day on22 April. They will also take notice of the events marked in the 2019 Calendar of the GCCM (Global Catholic Climate Movement).



National Holy Wells Day will be celebrated on Sunday 16 June. In Dublin this will be celebrated at St Broc's Well in the car park of St Damien's Poor Clare Convent, Simmonscourt Road. Knock Shrine will host a day on Climate Issues on May 18.

With the help of their local LSE contacts there will be dialogue with the 'movers and shakers' of the Province on ways to protect our Planet. The goal is to engage people locally and nationally with the challenge of climate change, to motivate changes in behaviour and to create structures for the generation and implementation of ideas. St Anne's Shankill

St Anne's Parish Shankill has several members who are involved with SAGE (Shankill Action for a Green Earth). Last autumn, the parish drafted an application to Dun Laoighaire Rathdown Co. Council for a grant to help develop part of St Anne's grounds into a wildflower meadow to encourage bio-diversity and pollinators. Christmas in the Village was observed with a stall promoting bee-friendly habitats – giving out free 'bee hotels' and bird boxes. Parishioners also drew attention to the newly voiced message of the new minister, Richard Bruton, that a revolution was needed across all areas of life and government if we are to address the urgent question of climate change realistically. Quaker United Nations Office – New Publications

The <u>Quaker United Nations Office</u> has published two new documents. The first, <u>The Role of Decentralised Renewable Energy in Peacebuilding</u>, is a working paper on how renewable energies can have a peacebuilding role. The second, <u>A Government Official's Toolkit</u>, can be used by citizens to engage their decision makers for more urgent action on climate change and other environmental crises. The booklet includes research from the most



recent IPCC Special Report on Global Warming of 1.5C. Click on the above links to access these documents as PDF versions.

Stop Food Waste!

<u>Stop Food Waste</u> a state-funded programme that encourages householders and communities to save money and help the environment by reducing food waste and also composting. They offer resources to communities and are available to do talks, workshops and courses where requested. These are free of charge for communities and cover food waste prevention, composting, or both. One of their popular courses is the <u>Stop Food Waste Challenge</u>. This involves participants meeting once per week for 4 consecutive weeks, and working through simple and achievable ways of reducing their food waste and saving money.



They also run the <u>Master Composter training course</u>, which trains participants to set up and run their own composting projects in their communities, with a view to turning waste into resource as well as educating their neighbours. Local Environmental Networks

Local Environmental Networks are set up all around Ireland and invite anyone with an interest in environmental issues to get involved. All around the country LENs are being used to bring people together, create meaningful projects for the local community, and impact the wider surroundings. Eco Challenge!

Rev Trevor Sargent's Ecological Notes for January 2019 - Anyone can be a 'Citizen Scientist': Will you help with research into soil health?



Rev Trevor Sargent is one of the Church of Ireland representatives on the ECI committee and ministers in the Diocese of Cashel, Ferns and Ossory. Trevor shared his Ecological Notes with us for the month of January.

He says Remember the drought of last summer 2018? The soil moisture levels in the south-east dropped alarmingly. Grass stopped growing. Crops and animals (including my bees) suffered. The reality of climate breakdown hit home as predicted. Unfortunately, climatologists are also predicting that further extreme weather will become increasingly common. How can we help one another to adapt to changes in growing conditions?

Collecting data to map changes in soil moisture content in 2019: Satellites are now able to correlate readings of soil moisture from soil moisture sensors stuck in your soil, as long as they are more than 30m from a road and at least 20m apart.

EU wide project needs data from thousands of food growers: 'Grow Observatory' is the name of an EU Commission funded project which provides soil sensors and support for anyone interested in 'adopting' one or more soil sensors, 'planting' them and uploading the data every two weeks. This requires the use of a smart phone.

Healthy soil is at the heart of a good Harvest Thanksgiving - (Matthew 13:8).

Kathy Merrifield, a nematologist at Oregon State University has said, 'Soil is much more than a prop to hold up our plants, healthy soil is a jungle of voracious creatures eating, defecating and reproducing their way toward glorious soil fertility. A single teaspoon (1 gram) of organically rich soil can hold up to one billion bacteria, several yards of fungal filaments, several thousand protozoa, and scores of nematodes. Soils with more organic matter tend to have more life, are better at retaining moisture and are less likely to flood. Mulching with compost, cover cropping and no-till farming practices tend to increase organic matter that is truly the foundation of life'.
