This sister now cries out to us because of the harm we have inflicted on her by our irresponsible use and abuse of the goods with which God has endowed her. Climate change disproportionately affects the poor.

It's the poor people of the world who will suffer most when we overuse the planet's resources.

16 year old Swedish school girl and Climate Activist Greta Thunberg proclaimed in January of this year at the World Economic Forum:

"I want you to act as if the house is on fire, because it is."

(This is an excerpt from a poem by Drew Dellinger) What did you do once you knew? "It's 3:23 in the morning and I'm awake... because my great great grandchildren won't let me sleep. My great great grandchildren ask me in dreams, What did you do while the planet was plundered? What did you do when the earth was unraveling? surely you did something ?... When the seasons started failing? surely you did something? As the mammals, reptiles, and birds were all dying? surely you did something? Did you fill the streets with protest when democracy was stolen? What did you do once you knew?"

What CAN we do about Climate Change?

How do we provide enough energy and food to sustain the amazing eco systems of our common home so that all life may thrive on this beautiful Blue Planet? American Cosmologist Brian Schwimme tells us at the end of his epic documentary "Journey of the Universe:"

"Awe and Wonder will lead us"

The words "awe" and "wonder" are employed at least fourteen times in the pope's encyclical Laudato Si... writes Creation Theologian Matthew Fox....without awe the universe becomes a marketplace for us, the pope teaches that "if we approach nature and the environment without this openness to awe and wonder ... our attitude will be that of masters, consumers, ruthless exploiters."

So long as we are in touch with "wonder and awe" we recognize a "continuing revelation of the divine" in the smallest and largest forms within nature.

We must first honor and cherish all creation as an expression or mirror of the Divine Beauty.

"This, then, is salvation, when we marvel at the beauty of created things and praise the beautiful providence of their Creator," wrote Meister Eckhart. Take some time to walk around our Eco Stations of the Cross (In Our lady of the assumption church in Newcastle). Enjoy the beautiful local nature photographs and the inspirational quotations on the walls.

The Irish Climate Justice Candle (here today), invites us to admire and contemplate, in Awe and Wonder, a leaf in our garden, a red squirrel or a river in Tollymore Forest Park or the Mountains of Mourne sweeping down to the sea.

After your contemplation, plan your actions, enjoy your ecological conversion of heart and your new environmentally friendly lifestyle.
