Eco-Congregation Ireland Launches GOLD Awards

The Eco-Congregation Ireland Gold Award is for those churches who have already received their initial Eco-Congregation Ireland Award. In order to receive an ECI Gold Award, churches have to show continuing work in all four areas of their initial ECI Award, and mentor another parish/community on their Award journey. So far, Westport Eco-Congregation, Co Mayo; SAGE - Shankill Action for a Green Earth, St Anne's Parish, Co Dublin; and Faith in Action Group, Ballineaspaig Parish, Co Cork; have been awarded a Gold Award.

Westport Eco-Congregation, Co Mayo

Westport Eco-Congregation's main event every year is Earth Hour. In 2020 'Earth Hour - At Home' was their first online event, joining in with the



global effort to power down, they took the opportunity to focus on the power down within their own homes. Westport Eco-Congregation launched their first online YouTube video, inviting people to join them in powering down but also to meditate in stillness, with the focus on connection to the Earth. For this, there was a guided meditation, some prayers, and a beautiful song 'A Message from Mother Earth'. This has received over 700 views! Eco-Congregation Ireland 2020 Award

In 2020 St Joseph the Artisan Church, Bonnybrook Parish received their Eco-Congregation Ireland Award. Their journey to becoming an Eco-Congregation began on a simple, practical level - action to save the many wild cowslips that push up through the grassy area in front of St Joseph's Family Centre. Parishioners then created a wildflower garden guided by the All-Ireland Pollinator Plan. These were their first steps on their journey to becoming an Eco-Congregation.

However, parishioners needed an overall inspiration and framework to give shape to the many small steps that evolved. The inspiration came from Laudato Si', quotations from which they placed each week in their parish newsletter. Guided by ECI's four areas, spiritual, practical, community and global, the Care for the Earth Ministry Group, in collaboration with the support of the Parish Pastoral Council, worked steadily over the following months, receiving in succession their Awareness and Endeavour Certificates. Recording all

their activities, even the smallest, and having a photographic record of many of them, parishioners received their Award.

Their journey continues with the creation of their Gratitude Tree which was to become their Lenten Awareness Tree. Each day, at the start of the liturgy, Fr Joe takes one card that outlines one of the Acts of Love for Lent, acts that inspire us to care for each other and for the Earth, our Common Home. Due to COVID 19 restrictions the award will not be presented to the parish for a few months.
